Translation Fishbowl

Friends are invited to watch Susan Furry and Benigno Sanchez-Eppler begin work on a brief selection from Isaac Penington which illustrates some of the challenges and complexities of translation from seventeenth-century Quaker prose. Their process of disentangling and discerning the English meaning may interest all Friends whether or not they understand Spanish.

Susan Furry has been a Friend in New England Yearly Meeting for about forty years. Now retired, she concentrates on the translation ministry and on writing "First Be Reconciled: What do Christians need to know about Judaism". <u>FirstBeReconciled.blogspot.com</u> is her recently begun blog. **Benigno Sánchez-Eppler** has been worshiping with Friends for thirty years and is currently a member of Northampton Meeting in New England Yearly Meeting. He has translated and interpreted for FWCC for twenty years. He co-clerks the Quaker Youth Pilgrimage, and teaches at the Cuban Quaker Peace Institute. Both are founding members of Puente de Amigos, the long-standing relationship between New England and Cuba yearly meetings.

Particular Challenges of Publishing Faith & Practice: a case study of New England Yearly Meeting

This workshop is a response to QUIP's request to explore my experience of revising *Faith and Practice* as a ministry of group writing and to explore if there might be ways in which QUIP might offer support to such ministries. The New England Yearly Meeting *Faith and Practice* Revision Committee has been laboring for twelve years at publishing the corporate word that is a Yearly Meeting *Faith and Practice*. I'll share our process and challenges—spiritual, organizational, and technological.

Jan Hoffman is now serving her thirteenth year as clerk of the NEYM *Faith and Practice* Revision Committee. She is a public Friend with a variety of experiences in many parts of the Quaker world, including serving as clerk of QUIP from 1993-1996. **Susan Davies,** Vassalboro Maine Monthly Meeting (New England YM), serves as recording clerk of the Revision Committee and will serve as elder for this workshop.

Marketing with Soul: Is it Possible?

Margaret Benefiel offers consulting, coaching, and spiritual direction for leaders and organizations, an adjunct faculty member at Andover Newton Theological School in Boston and a visiting lecturer at All Hallows College in Dublin, Ireland. She is the author of *Soul at Work* and *The Soul of a Leader*, and co-editor of *Hidden in Plain Sight: Early Quaker Women's Writings* and *The Soul of Supervision*. She has also written for *Friends Journal, Quaker Life, The Evangelical Friend,* and *Faith at Work.* She is a member of Beacon Hill Friends Meeting in Boston and lives in Boston with her husband.
